THE SUCCESSFUL DISCIPLE PRAYS

“Continue earnestly in prayer, being vigilant in it with thanksgiving.”

— Colossians 4:2 (NKJV)

INTRODUCTION:

Prayer is the source of strength and the foundation of all spiritual life. There is no true disciple without a life of prayer. Through prayer, we enter into communion with God, receive His direction, and are transformed. A successful disciple understands that without prayer there is no growth; without communion with God, there is no fruit, for apart from Him we can do nothing (John 15:5). All great biblical leaders—Moses, Joshua, Daniel, and Jesus Himself—succeeded because they depended completely on God through prayer.

1. PRAYER CONNECTS US TO THE PRESENCE OF GOD. *Colossians 4:2*

- **Prayer draws us closer to the heart of God.** – When we pray, we open our spirit to hear His voice and understand His will. We become more sensitive to His guidance. *“Draw near to God and He will draw near to you.” (James 4:8, NKJV)*
- **Prayers keep our faith burning.** – Prayer is like spiritual oxygen. Without it, faith fades and the heart grows cold. Prayer reminds us that we are not alone.
- **Prayer strengthens us in difficult times.** – In the midst of trials, prayer gives us peace and hope. When we don’t understand what’s happening, prayer connects us to the One who is in control. *“Don’t worry about anything; instead, pray about everything. Tell God what you need, and thank Him for all He has done. Then you will experience God’s peace, which exceeds anything we can understand.” (Philippians 4:6–7, NLT)*

2. PRAYER TRANSFORMS US AND TEACHES US TO DEPEND ON GOD.

- **Prayer shapes the character of Christ in us.** – Every time we pray, the Holy Spirit molds our mind and heart to be more like Jesus.
- **Prayer teaches humility and dependence.** – A praying disciple recognizes they cannot do it alone. Just as Jesus withdrew to pray, we also need to depend on the Father every day.
- **Prayer is the foundation of spiritual and personal success.** – Without a relationship with God, we cannot succeed in ministry or in family. The great biblical leaders understood that victory begins in God’s presence. *“I am the vine, you are the branches... for without Me you can do nothing.” (John 15:5, NKJV)*

3. PRAYER GIVES US ACCESS TO GOD'S POWER AND RESOURCES. *When we pray, we open the door to the supernatural.*

- **Prayer activates divine intervention.** – God responds to the faith of those who call on Him. It may not always change circumstances immediately, but it changes the course of things.
- **Prayer strengthens our faith to see miracles.** – The more we pray, the more confidence we develop that God can do the impossible. Faith grows when we pray with perseverance.
- **Prayer releases heaven's resources.** – Through prayer, God gives us wisdom, favor, provision, and open doors. It is the key that activates divine promises. *"The effective, fervent prayer of a righteous man avails much."* (James 5:16, NKJV)

CONCLUSION:

Spiritual success begins on your knees. A successful disciple does not depend on talent or experience but on intimacy with God. When we pray, we reflect Christ; when we stop praying, we drift away from Him.

Prayer keeps us connected, sensitive, and strengthened to fulfill our purpose. Just as Jesus rose early to seek the Father, we too must learn to live on our knees so we can walk in power. A life of prayer is a life of success.

THE SUCCESSFUL DISCIPLE READS THE BIBLE

“All Scripture is given by inspiration of God, and is profitable for doctrine, for reproof, for correction, for instruction in righteousness.”— 2 Timothy 3:16 (NKJV)

INTRODUCTION: The Bible is not an ordinary book; it is the living Word of God. Although it was written over 1,600 years, in 66 books, by more than 40 authors from different times, ages, and cultures, they all tell one great story: the grand love story of Jesus redeeming the world. Sin separated humanity from God, and Jesus Christ reunited them.

The Bible is the most read, translated, and sold book in history. Its prophecies—especially those concerning Jesus—have been fulfilled with precision, proving that it is not a human book but a divine one. A successful disciple recognizes that reading the Bible is not optional—it is a daily necessity because it is our guide for faith and conduct.

1. THE BIBLE IS THE WORD OF GOD. (2 Timothy 3:16)

- **Inspired by God.** – The Bible is not a book written by men but the very breath of God. *“For prophecy never came by the will of man, but holy men of God spoke as they were moved by the Holy Spirit.” (2 Peter 1:21, NKJV)* Every author wrote under the inspiration of the Holy Spirit, which ensures that its message is trustworthy and eternal. This gives us confidence: when we read the Bible, we hear the voice of God.
- **Useful for teaching and rebuking.**– It teaches truth in a world filled with lies and confusion. It rebukes—that is, it convicts and confronts our errors, like a mirror showing what needs to change. A successful disciple allows the Word to challenge them in order to grow.
- **Useful for correcting and training in righteousness.**– It corrects our way of living when we stray from the path. It trains us in righteousness, shaping us in the character of Christ. When we apply the Bible, it leads us to live a life that is upright, just, and fruitful.

2. HOW TO RECEIVE THE WORD

- **With your ears.**– *“So then faith comes by hearing, and hearing by the word of God.” (Romans 10:17, NKJV)* By listening to sermons, teachings, or even the Bible in audio form, we allow faith to enter our hearts. A successful disciple understands that every message can bring God’s direction and correction.
- **With your eyes.** – *“This Book of the Law shall not depart from your mouth, but you shall meditate in it day and night.” (Joshua 1:8, NKJV).* It’s not enough for others to read it to us; we need to open it with our own eyes. Personal reading allows God to speak directly to us. A simple habit: read the Bible in the morning before starting your day. This sets a spiritual focus that enlightens your decisions.
- **With your heart.**– *“I have hidden your word in my heart, that I might not sin against you.” (Psalm 119:11, NLT).* Memorizing and meditating on the Word is like planting seeds in the soil of our

lives—sooner or later, they will bear fruit. When the Word is in our hearts, the enemy cannot deceive us with lies because the truth is already rooted within us.

3. PRACTICAL TECHNIQUES FOR READING THE BIBLE.

- **Ask questions of the text.** – Ask: What is happening? Who is speaking? When did it occur? Where does it take place? How does it apply to me? Asking questions turns passive reading into a living dialogue with God. Example: Mark 4:35 — “Let’s cross to the other side of the lake.”
By asking, we discover that Jesus invites His disciples to move forward—to not remain where they are.
- **Emphasize every word.** – Reading slowly and stressing each part reveals new truths. Example: Psalm 23:1 — *“The Lord is my shepherd; I have all that I need.”* (NLT). This reminds me that He is not just any guide, but the Almighty Lord. This practice helps us squeeze every verse for its meaning rather than rushing through it.
- **Personalize the Word.** – Personalizing Scripture turns the Bible into an intimate letter from God to you. Insert your name into the verses. Example: Philippians 1:6 — *“He who began a good work in [your name] will continue His work until it is finally finished on the day when Christ Jesus returns.”* (NLT) Jeremiah 17:7–8 comes alive when you say, *“I am like a tree planted along a riverbank.”*

CONCLUSION: The Bible is not just information—it is transformation. When we read it with our ears, eyes, and heart, God teaches, corrects, strengthens, and equips us to live in victory.

A successful disciple knows that the secret of their strength is not found in their talent but in how much they are filled each day with the living Word of God.

INTERACTIVE QUESTIONS:

- In what ways has the Bible corrected or convicted you in your life?
- Which Bible reading technique (asking, emphasizing, personalizing) would you like to start practicing?
- What would happen in your life if you read the Bible consistently every day?

ACTION STEPS:

1. Read: Set aside at least 10 minutes daily to read the Bible. Use the 10-10-10 exercise (read, write, share), starting with Psalm 23.
2. Memorize: Choose one verse this week and repeat it until it stays in your heart.
3. Share: Tell someone what God spoke to you in your reading and encourage them to read with you.

THE SUCCESSFUL DISCIPLE WRITES THEIR DEVOTIONAL

“But Jesus answered him, saying, ‘It is written, Man shall not live by bread alone, but by every word of God.’— Luke 4:4 (NKJV)

INTRODUCTION: When we approach the Bible, we can do it in two ways: through logos, which is the general written teaching of God’s Word, or through rhema, which is when that Word becomes alive and personal to us. Rhema is not just information—it is revelation that the Holy Spirit brings to our hearts.

That is why it’s so important to find God’s rhema, because He wants to speak to us. When we write it down, we remember it more clearly, we make it our own, we can declare it in prayer, obey it in faith, and over time it becomes a testimony of God’s power in our lives.

1. RHEMA MAKES THE POWER OF GOD’S WORD VISIBLE. *“For the word of God is living and powerful, and sharper than any two-edged sword, piercing even to the division of soul and spirit, and of joints and marrow, and is a discerner of the thoughts and intents of the heart. And there is no creature hidden from His sight, but all things are naked and open to the eyes of Him to whom we must give account.”— Hebrews 4:12–13 (NKJV)*

- **It penetrates and reveals what is hidden.** – The revealed Word doesn’t stay on the surface; it cuts deep into the soul and spirit. When a rhema comes, it exposes attitudes, fears, motives, and reasons that were previously hidden.

Application: When you write down what the Spirit shows you, you identify what needs to be left behind or corrected and begin to pray specifically about it.

- **It turns promises into something tangible.** – A rhema takes a general promise from Scripture and makes it personal—something you can affirm, declare, and apply directly to your life. It’s no longer just a beautiful phrase or distant truth but a concrete instruction from God for your situation.

Practical example: If you read *“And my God shall supply all your need” (Philippians 4:19, NKJV)*, the Holy Spirit may make it a personal rhema for you: *“This month, I will open the door of provision.”* Writing it down moves you from simple hope to active faith—expecting and acting as someone who has already received the answer.

- **It produces visible evidence and real change.** – When you obey the rhema, God often confirms it with signs—deliverance, provision, restoration. What was inward becomes outwardly visible, and others notice.

Biblical illustration: Peter received a word (rhema) and, by obeying it, walked on the water (Matthew 14:29—an example of a rhema that produces visible action).

2. RHEMA COMES THROUGH THE REVELATION OF THE HOLY SPIRIT. *“But as it is written: ‘Eye has not seen, nor ear heard, nor have entered into the heart of man the things which God has prepared for those who love Him.’ But God has revealed them to us through His Spirit. For the Spirit searches all things, yes, the deep things of God.”— 1 Corinthians 2:9–10 (NKJV)*

Let’s ask the Spirit for a personal word.

- **Have hunger and expectation for God’s Word.** – Rhema often comes to those who seek God with humility and desire, praying, “Lord, what do You want to say to me today?”
Practice: Before reading, pray for 1–2 minutes asking for a specific verse for your day.
 - **How to ask for and receive a rhema.** – Ask clearly: “Holy Spirit, give me a verse for today.” Listen in silence, read slowly, and write down what stands out.
Technique: Read slowly, pause where a word “resonates,” and write it down with the date and a short prayer in response.
 - **Discernment and confirmation.** – Every rhema must be tested—make sure it doesn’t contradict Scripture (logos) and that it brings the peace of God. The Spirit confirms with Scripture and with fruit.
Practical rule: If the rhema leads you to love, obey, and glorify Christ, it is from God.
- 3. RHEMA MAKES GOD’S PROMISES VISIBLE IN OUR LIVES.** *“So He said, ‘Come.’ And when Peter had come down out of the boat, he walked on the water to go to Jesus.”— Matthew 14:29 (NKJV)*
- **A rhema is personal and specific.** – Not everyone receives the same rhema—God speaks personally. What encourages one person might give you the exact direction you need.

CONCLUSION: Rhema is not a fleeting emotion; it is God’s Word made personal, active, and effective. Writing it down anchors the revelation in your heart, turns it into memory, translates it into action, and brings it under the obedience that bears fruit.

A disciple who writes down their rhemas will live a life filled with visible evidence of God’s voice.

INTERACTIVE QUESTIONS:

- Have you ever received a rhema that came to pass after you wrote it down? Share briefly.
- What keeps you from writing what God speaks to you—lack of time, unbelief, or fear?

ACTION STEPS:

1. **Unplug:** Turn off or silence your phone and create 10–15 minutes of distraction-free time before reading.
2. **Ask the Spirit:** Pray for 1 minute asking for a personal verse or phrase; read slowly and immediately write what resonates (include the date + rhema).

Act: Add one concrete step and share your rhema with your leader for accountability.

THE SUCCESSFUL DISCIPLE GATHERS TOGETHER

“Not forsaking the assembling of ourselves together, as is the manner of some, but exhorting one another, and so much the more as you see the Day approaching.”— Hebrews 10:25 (NKJV)

INTRODUCTION: Gathering together is not a suggestion—it is a command from God and a clear sign of spiritual maturity.

A successful disciple understands that faith is not lived in isolation but in community. When we gather, we strengthen our faith, receive direction, are encouraged by others, and have the opportunity to serve and grow. Separating from the body of Christ weakens spiritual life, but staying connected to the body keeps us strong, healthy, and fruitful.

1. GATHERING IS AN EXPRESSION OF OBEDIENCE TO GOD.

- **Not gathering is disobedience to God.** – God calls us to live in community; when we choose not to gather, we close the door to many blessings that He pours out among His people.
- **Gathering demonstrates love and commitment.** – We don’t attend out of habit but because we love God and value His presence in the midst of His church. Jesus Himself went to the synagogue “as was His custom.” *“When He came to the village of Nazareth, His boyhood home, He went as usual to the synagogue on the Sabbath and stood up to read the Scriptures.” (Luke 4:16, NLT)*
- **Gathering strengthens our relationship with God and others.** – In the church we learn, grow, and are built up. There we receive fresh Word, worship together, and are reminded that we are not alone in the faith.

2. GATHERING PROTECTS US SPIRITUALLY. *“Two people are better off than one, for they can help each other succeed. If one person falls, the other can reach out and help.”— Ecclesiastes 4:9–10 (NLT)*

- **It guards us from spiritual coldness.** – When we isolate ourselves, we become more vulnerable to discouragement and temptation. Fellowship with other believers keeps our spiritual fire burning.
- **It gives us support in trials.** – In the church, we find people who pray for us, counsel us, and stand with us in difficult times.
- **It corrects and guides us on the right path.** – Within community, we are lovingly exhorted and corrected to stay firm in the truth. Accountability is part of spiritual growth.

3. GATHERING MOTIVATES US TO GROW AND SERVE. *“He makes the whole body fit together perfectly. As each part does its own special work, it helps the other parts grow, so that the whole body is healthy and growing and full of love.”— Ephesians 4:16 (NLT)*

- **In the congregation we develop our gifts.** – Each one has something to contribute—serving, teaching, encouraging, helping. As we participate, we strengthen the church and grow personally.
 - **In the congregation we are inspired to move forward.** – Hearing testimonies and seeing the example of others motivates us to keep growing and persevering in faith.
 - **In the congregation we prepare for eternity.** – The church is a glimpse of heaven: we worship together, learn together, and build each other up for the great day of the Lord.

1. **Make gathering a priority, not an option.** Plan your weeks around your times of fellowship.
2. **Participate actively. Don’t just attend**—greet others, pray, serve, and share.
3. **Encourage someone to return to church.** Your invitation could transform a life.

THE SUCCESSFUL DISCIPLE SERVES

“For even the Son of Man came not to be served but to serve others and to give His life as a ransom for many.”— Mark 10:45 (NLT)

INTRODUCTION:

Service is one of the most visible marks of a true disciple. Jesus, the greatest example of all, did not come to be served but to serve. He washed feet, healed the sick, fed multitudes, and gave His life out of love. Serving is not a burden—it is a privilege. 3. **Encourage others** to discover their gifts and serve alongside you—service is more powerful when we do it together!

1. **Examine your heart:** Identify areas where your generosity can grow (time, talents, resources).
2. **Act with joy:** Do one generous act this week—big or small—with a willing heart.
3. **Observe the impact:** Write down how your generosity blesses others and strengthens your faith and gratitude.

THE SUCCESSFUL REPRODUCES

“You have heard me teach things that have been confirmed by many reliable witnesses. Now teach these truths to other trustworthy people who will be able to pass them on to others.”

— 2 Timothy 2:2 (NLT)

INTRODUCTION:

A true disciple does not keep what they receive—they share it. The goal of discipleship is not only to learn but to multiply what has been learned in others.

Jesus didn’t look for crowds to follow Him; He sought disciples who would continue His mission. The true measure of spiritual success is not how much knowledge you have, but how many people you are forming with what God has given you.

Spiritual reproduction means raising new believers, new leaders, and new disciples who follow the same model of Christ. Reproduction ensures the growth of God’s Kingdom and the continuation of His work.

1. REPRODUCING IS OBEYING THE MODEL OF JESUS. *“Therefore, go and make disciples of all the nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and the Son and the Holy Spirit. Teach these new disciples to obey all the commands I have given you. And be sure of this: I am with you always, even to the end of the age.”— Matthew 28:19–20 (NLT)*

- **Jesus formed disciples, not just followers.** – He invested time, love, and teaching into twelve men who later changed the world. His vision was always multiplication.
- **Reproduction ensures the expansion of the Kingdom.** – When one disciple trains another, faith spreads beyond one person or generation. This is the divine principle of multiplication.
- **If we don’t reproduce, growth stops.** – A disciple who doesn’t teach others breaks the chain of spiritual growth. God expects us to leave a mark on others.

2. REPRODUCING REQUIRES INTENTIONALITY AND EXAMPLE. *“You have heard me teach things that have been confirmed by many reliable witnesses. Now teach these truths to other trustworthy people who will be able to pass them on to others.”— 2 Timothy 2:2 (NLT)*

- **It’s not just about speaking—it’s about modeling.** – People learn more from what they see than from what they hear. The best discipleship is a living example.
 - **Investing time in people is loving like Christ.** – Jesus didn’t just preach to crowds; He walked with twelve men, taught them, corrected them, and sent them out. We must do the same.
 - **Multiplying disciples takes patience and consistency.** – Spiritual reproduction doesn’t happen overnight, but when we are faithful, God produces abundant fruit. Reproduction
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leads to growth. We must raise new leaders who do what we do—have a “second” and even a “third” generation of disciples.

3. A DISCIPLE WHO REPRODUCES LEAVES A LEGACY AND EXPANSION. *“When you produce much fruit, you are my true disciples. This brings great glory to my Father.” — John 15:8 (NLT)*

- **The fruit of discipleship is another disciple.** – There is no clearer sign of spiritual maturity than helping others grow in their faith.
- **Spiritual reproduction brings joy and fulfillment.** – Seeing someone you have trained begin to lead, serve, and disciple others is one of the greatest rewards in the Christian life.
- **When you reproduce, you leave an eternal legacy.** – Your influence doesn’t end with you—it continues in the lives you’ve formed. In this way, your ministry multiplies beyond your time and strength.

CONCLUSION:

A successful disciple doesn’t stay stagnant—they multiply. What you receive is not just for you but to share with others.

Reproducing isn’t only about teaching—it’s about investing, accompanying, and shaping character in others. The growth of the church and the Kingdom depends on disciples who decide to reproduce in other leaders. Reproduction leads to growth.

3. **Multiply:** Encourage them to disciple others so the cycle of spiritual reproduction continues.
